
Hello human travelers!

What to See

The graves of American heroes who have served America, such as former Presidents William Howard Taft and John F. Kennedy.

It also has the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, which has the remains of unknown soldiers from World War I, World War II, and the Korean War, and a sculpture honoring servicewomen and dogs.

The words from two of

Gettysburg Address and his
second inaugural address – are
inscribed on the walls in big
letters.

Can you read them out loud?

The <u>Lincoln Memorial</u> – one of the most beautiful monuments in a city full of monuments!

More than seven million people visit here every year. It sits at one end of what's called the <u>National Mall</u> – a huge open area of memorials, museums, and even pools of water -- stretching to the U.S. Capitol.

Inside, it has a giant statue of Abraham (Abe)
Lincoln, the 16th U.S. president who led America
through the Civil War. Uh oh – I've lost my humans'
scent. Time to move on!







The columns stand for the role that all our states and the U.S. territories played in winning the war.

There are two engravings of "Kilroy was here" in the memorial. Kilroy is a doodle that soldiers use to draw on places. Can you find Kilroy on the memorial?

It's the <u>National World War II Memorial</u>, honoring the 16 million people who served America during World War II (1939 – 1945).

It's amazing – 56 columns in a semi-circle around a beautiful fountain and pool (so refreshing). Yikes! I've lost my family's scent! They walked over here.







I think they came over to the Washington Monument, honoring America's first president, George Washington. It sits at the center of the Mall.

Man is that TALL! It reminds me of one of my other favorite things – a really big stick.

If only I could get my mouth around it. Wait – what am I doing? I need to find my humans. Sniff, sniff - smells like history.

What to See

Sometimes the elevator inside is open and you can go to the top.

Do you see anything on the National Mall taller than the Washington Monument?



There are endless activities.

Finding my superpower, practicing baseball hitting and pitching, air basketball, model car racing, a wall to measure how high you can touch while jumping, a craft studio, a giant video screen, and more.

They're here at the <u>National Children's Museum</u>! Oh brother – there's that sign again – NO DOGS ALLOWED! Time to get sneaky.

I'll climb up this pole, go across the roof, climb onto the ceiling, and go down the three-story slide – WOO HOO!

The fastest way home is to hop on the Metro, cut through the yards in my neighborhood at top speed, scratch on the door, and sneak past the dog walker as she opens it.




Whew – that was close! My humans are so happy to see me but don't know how lucky they were to have me watching out for them all day!
